Course description

This course will prepare students for transition from student to professional by advancing their mastery of edible and ornamental horticultural crop principles and practices as they are driven by the interaction of cultivar genetics, plant physiology, and environmental influences; and by

exploring issues of economic and environmental sustainability and production efficiencies on a global scale.

Course learning outcomes

By the end of this course, students should successfully be able to:

- Understand professionalism and professional expectations, identify continuing education opportunities after graduation, as well as gain exposure to global production issues.
- Convey information, both individually and collaboratively, within a concise written and oral format to help them grow professionally.
- Identify production practices that could be altered to improve pest management, nutrient management and cropping system sustainability through using systems-scale thinking and development.
- Demonstrate scientific competence in horticultural and/or agronomic sciences.
- Appreciate diverse issues within horticultural and agronomic sciences.
- Use appropriate form of communication effectively at a professional level.

How This Course Works

Mode of delivery: This course is offered in person and requires attendance and engagement in class discussions. Lectures will be video-linked to remote graduate students, but remote students will be required to have their camera on and fully participate in all video-linked lecture periods. Lectures will not be recorded and will only be available via Zoom for remote graduate students or for pre-approved extenuating circumstances, but lecture slides will be posted on Carmen for review purposes. Keep in mind that a portion of the final grade is dependent on attendance and participation in class activities and discussions.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a 3 credit-hour course. According to Ohio State bylaws on instruction (go.osu.edu/credithours), students should expect around 3 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to 6 hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example) to receive a grade of C average.

Attendance and participation requirements: Research shows regular participation is one of the highest predictors of success. With that in mind, I have the following expectations for everyone's participation:

In-person attendance: Twice per week except for holidays

You are expected to attend all in-person class periods. If you have a situation that might cause you to miss class, especially multiple class periods, discuss it with me as soon as possible to arrange accommodations, as feasible depending on course activities.

Descriptions of major course assignments

Engagement and professionalism

Description: At the beginning, middle, and end of the course, you are required to complete brief self-assessment surveys. The intro survey is a series of questions where you are asked to provide some background information on yourself and familiarity with the topics. The midsemester and exit surveys ask you reflect upon the course components, your personal effort in the class, and how well the activities worked out. Each week throughout the term, you are expected to attend all class periods (on time and for the full period), actively participate in discussions and activities, and complete all assignments. Only two *excused* absences (providing valid documentation) will be allowed and associated make-up work accepted; beyond that, any absence for any reason will result in a loss of points for that day and acceptance of make-up work will not be guaranteed. If you have a situation that might cause you to miss class, especially multiple class periods, you must discuss it with me *within 24 hours of the absence*. You will be required to work with Student Life Disability Services or Student Advocacy, but I will coordinate as needed to provide equitable opportunities for all students. Furthermore, you are expected to behave in a respectful and professional manner throughout every aspect of this course.

Academic integrity and collaboration: Any behavior including rude, dehumanizing, or unprofessional language or actions, whether expressed physically, verbally, or in writing, is not permitted, will result in a deduction of points, and will be reported to the office of student conduct; this includes swearing, threats, derogatory statements, and similar actions, and applies to interactions among students and with the instructor and any guest speaker(s).

Cmap assignments

Description: Topics presented and discussed in class will be integrated and 'mapped' into the main course topic of agroecology. We will be using Cmap (or similar) software to help create visual representations of the interconnectedness of the topics. You will be required to add to your concept maps throughout the course and submit updated versions (as indicated in the schedule) by uploading to a Carmen dropbox by the posted deadlines. Once all course topics have been covered, a final version of the concept map will be due to Carmen.

Academic integrity and collaboration: Your written assignments, including concept maps, should be your own original work. In formal assignments, you should follow APA style to cite the ideas and words of your research sources (MLA format is not appropriate for scientific writing). You are encouraged to ask a trusted person to review your assignments before you turn them in, but no one else should revise or rewrite your work. Also, you are not allowed to submit the same work to fulfill assignments in different classes.

Writing assignments

Description: There will be five written assignments throughout the semester based on topics related to agroecology. Prompts will be posted on Carmen, and you will be required to submit a written response to each topic. Assignments must be typed and submitted to the Carmen dropbox and will be checked for plagiarism and AI generation.

Academic integrity and collaboration: Your written assignments should be your own original work. Any time you are presenting a factual statement, you should cite a reference using APA format or following the guidelines of a reputable scientific journal; MLA format is not appropriate for scientific writing. You are encouraged to ask a trusted person to proofread your assignments before you turn them in, but no one else should revise or rewrite your work. All written assignments will be evaluated using Turnitin software to check for any plagiarism. Also, you are not allowed to submit the same work to fulfill assignments in different classes.

Presentation

Description: You will be required to give a 15-minute oral presentation throughout the semester (schedule will be determined during the first week of class). Presentations will cover a topic you select, but must pre-approved by me (the instructor), and should focus on an advanced subject related to agroecology. Details posted in Carmen. All students are required to view all other presentations and provide professional and constructive peer reviews. However, if any presentation contains rude, dehumanizing, or unprofessional language, it will be ended immediately, the recording will not posted for later viewing, and the presenter earn zero points for that assignment.

Academic integrity and collaboration: The course includes many opportunities for formal collaboration with your classmates. And while you are encouraged to discuss the topics with each other and peer-review early drafts, your presentation content and video must be your own original work.

Late assignments

Late submissions will marked down by 10% of the original assignment value per day (including partial days). Please refer to Carmen for due dates. And if extenuating circumstances prevent you from completing any course assignment, please reach out to me ASAP to arrange an accommodation. You will be required to work with Student Life Disability Services, but I will follow approved accommodations to provide equitable opportunities for all students. For extended issues, please work with Student Advocacy to arrange necessary accommodations.

Engagement and Professionalism Guidelines

The following are my expectations for how we should communicate as a class. Above all, please remember to be respectful and thoughtful.

Tone and civility: Let's maintain a supportive learning community where everyone feels safe and where people can disagree amicably. I will provide specific guidance for discussions on controversial or personal topics as needed.

Citing your sources: Any time you are presenting a factual statement in writing, you should cite a reference using APA format or following the guidelines of a reputable scientific journal; MLA format is not appropriate for scientific writing. Furthermore, when we have academic discussions, it will be helpful, and at times critical, to cite your sources to back up what you say.

Plagiarism: No form of plagiarism will be tolerated, including self-plagiarism. In general, you are prohibited in university courses from turning in work from a past or concurrent class to your current class, even if you modify it. If you want to revisit a topic you've explored in previous courses, please discuss the situation with me.

Academic Misconduct/Academic Integrity

Academic integrity is essential to maintaining an environment that fosters excellence in teaching, research, and other educational and scholarly activities.
